Dear Parents,

Firstly, a big thank-you to all of you for being so vigilant with following all our COVID restrictions. I know that for many of you this was your child's first Book Week Parade at school and this would have been celebrated with everyone present. I appreciate your support and understanding with this. The children had a great day and later in the newsletter we have some snapshots of the great book characters that appeared on the day.

Book Week Activities

Each day we have a special "BOOK FEST" activity.

Thursday, we celebrate the many cultures around the world and that we have in our school. Each child had a passport to visit a particular country and participate in an activity. They went from England and the UK where they built the Tower Bridge using Lego and building blocks over a makeshift River Thames. To Korea, where they participate in Korean creative drumming, visit Japan and participate in making a Cherry Blossom Tree, making Pocky Sticks and drawing Pokémon characters to beautiful lantern making in Vietnam. Dot painting in Australia and listening to first nation musicians, Spanish Dancing in Spain, Alpine hats from Northern regions of Italy, Flag making in India and making Leprechauns, Shamrocks, Celtic knots and Irish Dancing in Ireland. In China, they make Tangrams and participated in Chinese Dancing plus learning amazing facts about China. Each group rotated through a country and worked with different children from different year levels. Reading with your child

Book Week is a great reminder for us of why it is so important to read with your child. This does not mean listening to them read a reader (which is also very important) but enjoying books together even if they are not at your child's reading level.

Whether you're reading a classic novel or fairy tales before bed, reading aloud to children can significantly benefit your child's life

Reading aloud builds vocabulary which is linked to higher marks Reading aloud in school is important for Reasons to read to Reading vour children Reading aloud aloud builds general for 20 minutes knowledge, which is important for every day comprehension and being a well-rounded person Reading aloud Reading aloud strengthens the parent-child bond PICTURE WALKS ARE A BOOK: FLICK THROUGH AND LOOK AT THE PICTURES,

WORSHOP DESCRIPTION

This workshop will explain the neurobiological development of children aged 0-6 and adolescents 9-17. It will discuss some of the key parental and family interactions that underpin healthy neurological development, the foundations of emotional regulation, the skills for developing and maintaining peer relationship and engagement with learning. Further, it will explore how these things promote resilience and enhance the experience of wellbeing.

ABOUT THE PRESENTER

Michael Lincoln is a teacher within Catholic Education South Australia. His current role is an Education Advisor: Engagement and Wellbeing within the Learning Diversity and Wellbeing Team in the Catholic Education Office. In this role Michael works with schools to support teachers to understand the causes of student inappropriate behaviour and develop strategies to modify the behaviour or assist it to stop. Michael has a keen interest in the power of Restorative Practices to assist children and young people to develop conflict resolution skills and transform school communities. For the last 9 years Michael has worked closely with The Australian Childhood Foundation to understand early childhood and adolescent brain development and the importance of strong, healthy, nurturing relationships for self-management, social engagement, resilience and learning.



Dear Parents and Caregivers

Twice per term, your child(ren) will receive an "all-ages" catalogue from Scholastic Book Club. Book Club is run by volunteers at CTK to promote a love of reading and as a fundraiser for our library. Every purchase adds resources to our school library: 20% of your purchase is returned to CTK as credit to spend on Scholastic materials of our choice for our library. This makes a BIG difference to our library budget and helps keep our library fresh and relevant, so a very big thank you to everyone who has participated in the past! If you have friends or relatives who would like to access Book Club and support our school by making purchases, spare catalogues can be obtained from the office.

To pay for your Scholastic books, transactions are done via LOOP, either online or via the phone app. Instructions are on the back of your catalogue. It is our school policy not to take cash.

By default, all purchases are sent home via the classroom. However, the LOOP system does have a tick box allowing parents to mark their purchases as gifts. If you do this, your purchase will be held for you in the school office so you can sneak it home. Look for the tick box at the top of the order form near your child's name.

If you would like to purchase from Issue 6, orders need to be placed on LOOP by Friday **10**th **September.** Your form **should not** be returned to school. Please remember, to protect your order, we do not take cash for Book Club.
